Reason to smile

Humpty Doo teenager Jessie Drahm-Webb has plenty of reason to smile this week - she will have new braces - put on for free.

"I feel like I've won the lotto," said the 14-year-old, who is receiving free orthodontic treatment as part of the new national Give a Smile program.

The aim of Give a Smile is to enable orthodontists to help Australians whose financial circumstances prevent them from accessing treatment through the private health system.

Each Give a Smile orthodontist has pledged to accept a minimum of one patient per year from the public health waiting list into their practice.

Each treatment takes about two

years and would normally cost about \$5000-\$7000 per patient. All the work the orthodontist will undertake will be pro-bono.

The program also takes strain off the public waiting lists.

Public dental health waiting lists have decreased by 10 per cent since the launch of Give a Smile in June last year - a saving more than \$1 million a year for taxpayers.

Jessie was nominated by a local Give a Smile screener, who is responsible for identifying potential Give a Smile patients.

Jessie's treatment will include removing several teeth and placing braces on in an effort to straighten her "badly twisted" back teeth and severe overbite.
